Jared Holstad: Community Builder of the Year

Chapter President Jared Holstad won the Community Builder of the Year Award, an award given to an individual within Greek Life who promotes unity within the Greek community and Pullman at large.

To earn this award, Holstad focused on risk policies and community safety, such as working with IFC to instill ways to keep chapters safe with regards to COVID-19, while simultaneously serving as WA Alpha's Chapter President.

WA Alpha receives multiple Arête Awards

On Wednesday, November 18, the WSU Center for Fraternity and Sorority Life held their annual Arête Awards ceremony, a lasting tradition recognizing outstanding members within the Panhellenic, Fraternity, and Multi-cultural communities. The awards given succeeded both the 2019 fall and 2020 spring semesters.

Washington Alpha finished the night receiving four chapter awards: Highest Fall 2019 GPA, Highest Spring 2020 GPA, Highest New Member GPA of Spring 2020, and the Global Citizenship Award.

The chapter also won two individual awards in Chapter President Jared Holstad receiving the Community Builder of the Year Award and Washington Alpha winning IFC Chapter of the Year for the fourth time in six years.

WA Alpha is humbled to have received the awards that they did and looks forward to working towards more awards in the future. They will maintain a focus on academics, community engagement, and being leaders in the Greek system while bettering themselves as a chapter and as individuals along the way.

Flattening the Curve

Amidst the Covid-19 outbreak, WA Alpha's David Jaquish turned to student donors who've recovered from Covid-19 for convalescent plasma donations in an effort to help diagnosed patients recover from the disease.

Jaquish, who serves as Director of Service and Philanthropy for WSU's Interfraternity Council, originally sought to conduct traditional blood drives when he partnered with Vitalant Blood Donations in September. However when students who planned to donate contracted Covid-19, a regular blood drive became an issue.

In response to this, Jaquish and other members of the Greek community worked alongside Vitalant Blood Donations to organize numerous convalescent plasma drives for students who had recovered from Covid-19 with the first drive occurring on October 19th.

Convalescent plasma from donors who have recovered from Covid-19 contains antibodies that can be transfused to patients with severe cases of the disease in order to aid them in their recovery process.

A plasma drive was even held in the WA Alpha chapter facility on October 26th which yielded multiple donations.

Jaquish, who served as WA Alpha's Vice President of Scholarship in 2018, believes that as the number of students who recover from cases increases, more plasma donations will be achieved.

"You can't un-contract Covid-19," Jaquish said. "The only thing you can do is try to make things better for others suffering from the disease."



48 Miles in 48 Hours



At 4 PM on Sunday, March 7th, six brothers completed the 4x4x48 challenge, putting their mental and physical toughness to the test running 48 miles in 48 hours to raise money for the SEAL Legacy Foundation.

The members that completed the challenge were juniors Nick Fazio, Andrew Hansen, Conner Rath, and Cass Riggan, sophomore Jackson Burpee, and senior Jack Hill.

Nick Fazio organized the challenge, which was inspired by retired Navy SEAL David Goggins. Donations that were raised support the families of fallen Navy SEALs, specifically the 115 United States Navy SEALs that have lost their lives since 9/11.

Starting at 8 pm Friday, 3/5, members participating ran 4 miles every 48 hours, running at 4, 8, and 12 AM and PM until Sunday at 4 PM.

After each run, members turned to social media to encourage their peers and family members to donate.

By the end of their last 4 miles, the group raised \$7,500 to fund a scholarship for the child of a fallen SEAL.

Exceeding Expectations

However, if they reached their original goal of \$10,000, an additional \$5,000 would be added to their donations by a member of the SEAL Legacy Foundation, allowing the group to fund scholarships for 3 different children of wounded and fallen SEALs.

Hearing this, members of Washington Alpha turned to social media to advertise their brothers' journey in an effort to help them achieve their goal.

Their \$10,000 goal was met and boosted by an additional \$5,000, for a total of \$15,000 from 118 donors.

“This challenge untapped reserves of perseverance and truly showed the power of positivity to my fellow runners and I,” said Jack Hill.

For now, this group of dedicated members rests, happy with the support they've received from their family and friends and the donations they have generated.


Alumni Ken Christianson Launches Donation Challenge
